





CEO UPDate

hen I think of the name 'Kadesh' I think of waiting, waiting to enter the promised land. I don't know about you but waiting has formed a large portion of my experience to date (whether the waiting relates to my working or personal life).

In Langley we have many development opportunities that we are currently waiting to see come to fruition. We of course have regular meetings where we 'track progress' which is a business term for waiting!

In the waiting season I find we need to trust more, to hold on to the vision of the outcome we are waiting for in an even more meaningful way. I also need to encourage myself to keep believing for the desired outcome and to encourage others around me to do the same. It is absolutely true that I learn more in the waiting, I learn about myself and what causes me to doubt or lose hope, I learn about my fears and what drives me. Through that greater understanding I can hopefully enter periods of waiting with more understanding and resilience.

Our clients have often experienced long periods of waiting, having experienced prison sentences during which their lives and aspirations were put on hold, ultimately losing hope of a better future. At Langley we look to reignite that hope in their hearts, to help them see a brighter future.

If you are in a period of waiting, I want to encourage you to keep going. Just like someone rowing a boat across a large lake, the distance to the other side is not known but the other side is still there (that is a fact), so keep going. I pray that you will be given all you need for the journey of waiting and that you would be blessed not only in seeing the final outcome but in the growth you experience in that journey.

Kadesh

A place of rest & sanctuary

THIS IS EXACTLY WHAT WE AIM TO DO AT KADESH: OFFER A PLACE OF REST AND RESTORATION TO OUR CLIENTS WHO HAVE OFTEN HAD TRAUMATIC LIVES AND FACED SIGNIFICANT DIFFICULTIES COMING OUT OF CUSTODY.

adesh is one of our supported housing services, providing homes, support and stable environments to help people with convictions to transform their lives. Recently renamed, Kadesh has undergone some exiting developments this year as it has taken on the old Shrubbery care home site in Rochester. This has increased the service's capacity as well as given new opportunities to provide different levels of support, accommodation and activities for our clients.

Melinda Grahn, who was previously at the Shrubbery, is the new Housing Services Manager at Kadesh. We'll let her introduce you to this service in her own words...

Kadesh is made up of a large hostel for men, alongside a number of houses in the community for both men and women. We are one of the few Langley services that can support women with convictions – one of whom you'll hear from in a few pages time!

Our hostel sleeps 14 men, each with their own bedroom. Currently every bed is filled which is fantastic as it means those needing our help are accessing it. Clients who live in the community are more capable of independent living and in our hostel we encourage elements of independent living (e.g. self-catering and self-medicating). However, many of our clients benefit from extra support to build their life skills, such as managing budgets, basic cooking skills and how to maintain a tenancy, etc.

We're passionate about providing individuals with activities and opportunities that not only develop their skills, but also improve their mental and physical well-being. We have a karaoke machine, and frequently hear singing filtering through

the building. We host a 'Give It A Go' club every Thursday and put on activities like quizzes, bingo, guest speakers, etc. Our chaplain often attends these sessions so it's a great opportunity for our clients to connect with her. A few of our clients are keen gardeners and have planted lots of vegetables which they are very proud of – we might even have a farmers' market one day, turn over to see more!

The service is staffed 24/7 by a fantastic and experienced team, who are invaluable to supporting individuals with convictions to transform their lives.

As mentioned, previously known as the 'Kent Resettlement' service, we've recently renamed to 'Kadesh' which refers to the place where God's people stopped before crossing the River Jordan into the promise land. It means 'holy place, sacred' and signifies a sanctuary and a place to rest. This is exactly what we aim to do here: offer a place of rest and restoration to our clients who have often had traumatic lives and faced significant difficulties coming out of custody.



t Langley we seek to provide meaningful activities and environments where clients will grow and flourish. Until very recently the large gardens at Kadesh were completely overgrown and unusable.

One day Derek* decided he wanted to tackle the garden which has since lead to amazing growth – both in the garden and in himself.

I HAVE BEEN AT KADESH FOR 3 MONTHS BUT SO MUCH HAS CHANGED – ME AND THE GARDEN. I DIDN'T KNOW WHERE TO START BUT ONCE I GOT GOING IT WAS A REASON TO GET UP AND DRESSED.

My mental and physical health has improved. I feel proud of what I have done. I walk around every day and love seeing the changes as things start to grow.

I have also grown. I was in a horrendous situation and moving to the hostel has given me a reason for living.

I love being in the garden, come rain or shine and I like the feeling of having done a good day's work. I'm sleeping better, feel better and probation are so pleased with my progress.

■ adesh is one of the few services within Langley who can offer support to both males and females with convictions. We caught up with Jenny* one of our clients who has kindly shared with us some of her experiences of life and moving to Kadesh.

How would you describe what your life was like before you came to Kadesh? Rubbish! My mood was low and it was unfulfilling. My future looked bleak.

How did it feel when you first arrived here? Scary! Though I felt welcomed by the staff.

How has the service and the people here impacted your life?

Kadesh has helped me with so much. It has helped me sort out practical issues, but more it has helped my self-esteem and selfconfidence. I now have friends, too.

What are you most thankful for in your time here?

Getting help to live my life fully. I've been given a second chance, and I feel accepted and valued.

What are your hopes for the future?

I have hopes to have contact with my daughter, to go to work, and to move on and live my best life!

Pause For Thought Preams require wide open spaces.

I recently spotted a picture on Pinterest – a quote beautifully framed by an open gate leading onto a wide beach with the ocean beyond. The quote read "Dreams require wide open spaces." I think it refers to a line in a Dixie Chicks song, but I know I flourish in wide open spaces, walking my dog in the park is often where I have good ideas.

A year ago we learnt that the word 'Langley' probably originates from the words 'long' and 'lea' describing a wide-open space, often a glade in a woodland. A place of perspective and fresh air, a place of new beginnings. In Psalm 18 the psalmist speaks of God having brought them into just such a space accompanied by a deep sense of rescue and divine delight.

This is exactly what we want our clients to experience when they come to Langley, a new perspective, a sense of fresh air, a place of new beginnings. We find the same sentiment in Psalm 31.8 and in Psalm 118.5.

In Romans 5 the message translation says:

"We find ourselves standing where we always hoped we might stand, out in the wide-open spaces of God's grace and glory, standing tall and shouting our praise."

My prayer for Kadesh – meaning a holy space, a place of rest, a sanctuary – is that it would epitomise the Langley we want to be. A place where clients find themselves standing where they always hoped they might stand, out in the wide-open spaces of God's grace and glory, standing tall and shouting his praise. This is my prayer for each of us too.
